Dear friends,

Thrilling as it is to see the way that the anthroposophic medical movement is developing worldwide, the study of its medical understanding of the human being seems all the more urgent. That is why, during the summer time with its true "time-out" moments, I want to call to mind the informative outline which Rudolf Steiner sketched out in his notebook to put into words the way the interaction of the human constitutional elements occurs in reality:

The I body provides form at the physical level, inner movement in the etheric entity, inner life in the astral entity, ensoulment in the spirit.

The astral body provides movement at the physical level, desire in the etheric entity, feeling in the astral entity, thinking in the spirit.

The etheric body provides self-experience at the physical level, self-knowledge in the etheric entity, self-preservation in the astral entity, memory in the spirit.

The physical body gives egoity/inwardness at the physical level, imagination in the etheric entity, sentience/feeling in the astral entity, perception in the spirit.

This can also show us how necessary it is that we look at the foreign words physical, etheric and astral, which come from the Greek and Latin, and our native word I (not ego!) as the terminology which gives our therapeutic approach a clear identity. As much as Rudolf Steiner in his lectures often used different expressions to explain something, as consistently he uses this terminology in his written work, including in his last book written with Ita Wegman, Extending Practical Medicine/GA27.

I see this approach as being exemplary for all of us – because that is how we can be taken seriously in scientific terms. The academic world lives off international communication in any given field and the terminology introduced in such a context. Thus we also have to ensure with the translations into Japanese and Chinese that this is done analogously to the integration of other scientific terms in scientific publications, or analogously to the principles of "Yin" and "Yang" introduced into German from Chinese medicine which – like any terminology – require explanation. Thus in the Asian languages Japanese, Thai and Chinese we take the word for body or organisation from the language of the country and combine it with the foreign word physical, etheric, astral and the word for I in the language of the country.

The Conference of the Executive Councils of Anthroposophic Medical Associations will discuss this subject at its meeting at the Goetheanum this year. After all, we, as the anthroposophic medical movement as a whole, are responsible worldwide for our identity in research and teaching, science and our public profile.

The result of the study with 220 patients showed an increase in survival time for patients treated with Iscador; they survived an average of 4.8 months instead of 2.7 months.
